



Circuits

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The “supremely confusing” sentences are descriptions of cases that were decided by the U.S. Supreme Court. The numbers in parentheses are the years in which the cases were decided, which should help disambiguate some of these cases. We then index into these case names by the circuit courts of appeals (clued by “appeal” and “circuits”) it came from.

A GVR order is a grant, vacate, and remand order sometimes issued by the Supreme Court. The “R” stands for **REMAND**.
